Components of Each Lesson

Reading Passage: Each lesson begins with a reading comprehension passage. Students will learn about famous and not so famous people in America who did extraordinary things. Many of these people never received recognition, or if they did it was not publicized as it could have been.

Vocabulary: Students will use context clues to "figure out" the bold-faced vocabulary words in each passage. The importance of context clues cannot be stressed enough. This skill is very important in helping students increase not only their vocabulary skills, but reading comprehension as well.

Reading Comprehension Questions: Each section includes reading comprehension questions based on the passage. Inference and "right there" questions are both included.

Constructed Response: Many of the weekly lessons includes a constructed response question. Students are able to practice writing constructed responses based on the diversity reading for the week.

The Inspirational Story of Apolo Anton Ohno

- A Apolo was born in 1982 to parents who were of both Japanese and Euro American descent. He was born and grew up in Washington state. Apolo was raised by his father who was a single parent. Not wanting Apolo to have too much **idle**, or free, time after school, his father involved him at an early age with competitive swimming and quad speed roller skating (skates with 4 wheels). He started short-track speed skating (skaters race against each other on an **oval** ice track instead of against the clock) when he was twelve.
- B By the time he was fourteen years old, Apolo became the youngest skater ever to be **accepted** at the United States Olympic Training Center in Lake Placid, New York. The center is a campus where athletes live and are provided with coaching, training, and the necessary **tools** to help them compete in world championships events. He was so good that he became the first American skater to win a world cup title.
- **C** Apolo competed in the 2002, 2006, and 2010 Winter Olympic Games as a short-track speed skater. In total, he collected two gold, two silver, and four bronze medals. Apolo would now be the most decorated American athlete in the history of the Winter Olympics. He was inducted into the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame in 2019.
- **D** Apolo Ohno has become a best-selling author and inspirational speaker since he retired from skating. Helping others succeed and finding success in life is one of his passions. Apolo speaks to others in order to inspire them to pursue new goals and persevere in all aspects of their lives.
